Welcome from Host Church

Michael welcomed the body to the church. The church was started in 1820 by nine families from South Carolina. Dr. Charles Stillman was the pastor and in 1876 he started Tuscaloosa Institute, which became Stillman College, for black men to enter the ministry.

"Good News" Moment Mission Coordinator

Ralls Coston

1. The AnneManie project is progressing. The roof of the Principal's house has been replaced. The pavilion has been built, with the plumbing stubbed in. Most of the electrical wiring has been installed and power is connected. Most of the interior walls have been sheet rocked. The construction company, RD Squared LLC, has received three draws of grant funds. The three draws total \$180,000. On July 14, Keri Burns and Traci Hanrahan of Samford and a videographer, Rev.

Ephraim, Alicia Foster and I met for lunch in Camden and then visited the Principal's house. The construction work was videoed and Rev. Ephraim spoke on camera about the former schools in Wilcox County. Programming has begun, with a Vacation Bible School being done at Arlington Presbyterian Church. Some of the program workers have been hired and paid. It was found that the children in the area needed transportation to the VBS and any other programs. Southminster Presbyterian Church donated an unused van to the project to solve this problem.

2. The Congo Pentecost Offering has received \$6,000 to date. The Congo Mission Team decided to send \$8,000 to Durable Solutions Congo. Larry Streshley works with this organization. Of the Team's contribution, \$3,000 was given to Streshley's work on the Ebola outbreak. The other \$5,000 was sent to pay for a consultant and specialists to train and deliver services as needed.
3. We sent \$1,000 from the Perry/Dallas County fund to Sowing Seeds of Hope to help them with its back-to-school event in Marion.
4. We also obtained a \$5,000 grant from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for the Korean Presbyterian Church in Montgomery. The church suffered storm damage in May.
5. We are planning to sponsor the construction of a Habitat for Humanity house in the Birmingham area in the autumn. More details will follow.

- **Property formerly owned by Church of the Good Shepherd (Anniston):**
On June 30, 2026, this property, situated at 461 Choccolocco Road, Anniston, Calhoun County, Alabama, was sold to New Hope Ministries, Inc., for a purchase price of \$350,000 cash, less closing expenses, netting proceeds to The Presbytery of Sheppards and Lapsley, Incorporated, in the amount of \$326,188.59. The property was conveyed in accordance with the terms of a

Contract of Sale approved by the Presbytery in its assembly held on May 21, 2026.

- **Property formerly owned by Center Point Presbyterian Church (Birmingham):**

This property, situated at 2650 Center Point Parkway, Center Point, Jefferson County, Alabama, is currently subject to a Commercial Sales Agreement between The Presbytery of Sheppards and Lapsley, Incorporated, as seller, and Minerva Hernandez and Pedro Valeriano, as purchasers, for a purchase price of \$300,000 cash. This Commercial Sales Agreement was approved by the Presbytery in its assembly held on May 21, 2026, contingent on the purchasers providing evidence that they will be able to obtain financing for their purchase. The purchasers now have provided copies of letters from financial institutions satisfying this condition. (We have been advised that the rights of the purchasers under this Agreement may be assigned to a business that is owned by Mr. Valeriano—JV Steel Erectors LLC—as would be allowed by the terms of the Commercial Sales Agreement.) Closing was originally scheduled for July 24, 2026, but has been postponed until August 17, 2026, to allow additional time for the appraisal report to be issued and to be evaluated by the purchaser's lender. We continue to hope that the sale will be closed as anticipated by the Commercial Sales Agreement.

Commission on Preparation for Ministry Appendix C-11

Congo Partnership

Congo Partnership Team met June 12. At that time we had received approximately \$5100 from the Congo Pentecost Offering. Hopefully more will come in later. Since we had a little over \$8000 in our accounts we voted to send \$5000 to IMCK to support a 6 month residency by Dr. Naomi Boyd (daughter of Jeff and Christy Boyd) at the hospital to improve ER, Pediatrics, etc. and provide training. We also sent \$3000 to Dr. Larry Sthreshley, Durable Solutions, toward a fund for Ebola response. We are hopeful that we will receive more money from our churches as our partners will soon be requesting funds for tuitions for students from our partner presbyteries to study at IMCK (Christian Medical Institute of the Kasai) and at the University of Sheppard and Lapsley.

COMMITTEE REPORT: ANTI-RACISM COMMITTEE PRESBYTERY OF SHEPPARDS AND LAPSLEY

August 2026

Having convened in three work sessions and two committee meetings since the Presbytery Meeting in May 2026, the Anti-Racism Committee has confirmed strategic goals that will direct the committee's work over the calendar year. The goals are aligned with emphases on continuing education, partnerships, allocation of funds for reparative justice (Legacy Fund for Enduring Witness), position statements for approval by the Presbytery, and frameworks for the assessment of action items.

In alignment with the goals for continuing education, the Executive Council has approved an enrichment session to be facilitated by the Anti-racism Committee during the August Presbytery Meeting.

The enrichment session is open to all Presbyters and will incorporate the following agenda items.

Overview: Special Committee on The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and Race

The Special Committee was organized to conduct historical and strategic analyses of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) regarding identity, culture, and past actions related to diversity, anti-racism, equity, inclusion, and racial justice.

After a four-year period of organizational introspection, study, and strategic retrospection, the following recommendations were presented to the 227th General Assembly for approval.

The following recommendations were approved by the 227th General Assembly in June 2026.

Overview: Special Committee on The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and Race

- Direct Presbyterian Life & Witness (PL&W) to create a tracking system that displays the progress of all GA business, beginning with business related to race and racism, dating back (at least) to reunion in 1983.
- Direct PL&W to assemble and centralize resources on diversity, anti-racism, equity, inclusion, and racial justice.

Suggested Resources:

Worship liturgies, prayers, hymns, reports of the General Assembly, youth adult study materials, publications, and policies.

Overview: Special Committee on The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and Race

- Dedicate budgetary resources to support the staff and to continue and expand the Matthew 25 Movement.
- Direct PL&W to provide interpretation and translation “in any language necessary” for people to participate fully in future General Assemblies. (Language Justice)
- Amend the Book of Order to require that mid-councils hold antiracism training at least every three years for teaching elders, commissioned ruling elders, persons “certified and called to service” in congregations, councils, and church-related entities.

Overview: Special Committee on The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and Race

(Inquirers and candidates are also included in the Book of Order Amendment.)

- Direct PL&W to provide annual antiracism training, accessible to all members and councils of the PC(USA).

Key Learnings Stated By The Special Committee:

Relationships built upon intent, honesty, equity, mutual respect, support, and balance are primary for wholeness.



As an agency of the General Assembly, Presbyterian Life & Witness is called to convene, connect, equip, and empower the

whole church in discipleship toward wholeness – in the PC (USA) and beyond.

Rooted in the concept of “shalom” – peace is the presence of healing, justice, restoration, and a just relationship. The meaning of peace is not just the absence of conflict. (*Peacemaking: The Believer's Calling*, 1980)



A priority of Presbyterian Life & Witness is **Restorative Justice & Witness**. Restorative justice is God's love and wholeness expressed through relationships in the community. It seeks healing for harm that has occurred through human, systemic, and natural ways and it restores wholeness among individuals, communities, and nations.

The Presbyterian Church (USA) has a justice-seeking history that includes compassion for those in need; hospitality for strangers; justice through legal actions, social change, and



personal healing; and social witness and advocacy.

I spent the first 55 years of my life in North Carolina where I was born, educated, worked (and retired), and reared my two children. My mother, son, daughter-in-law, and two grandsons still live there. My daughter and her husband live in Decatur, Georgia. I have two “bonus” sons who live here in Alabama.

I describe my faith journey as Quaker-Metha-terian. As a young child, I attended a Society of Friends (Quaker) Meeting with my grandmother. As a pre-teen and teenager, I attended a United Methodist church where my organ teacher was the organist. While there I sang in the choir and played the organ on occasion. After college, when I began dating my first husband I began attending First Presbyterian Church, Norwood, NC with him. I joined the church by baptism in 1988, became a Deacon in 1995, and was ordained as an Elder in 1996. During my 30+ years at Norwood FPC, I served in a variety of roles including: choir, handbell choir member and director, musician, youth Sunday school teacher, Sunday school director, youth choir director, Presbyterian Women, deacon, elder, grant writer, newsletter producer, church Facebook page administrator, mission liaison, sabbatical congregational activity coordinator, liturgist, and confirmation mentor.

After two years of dating long distance. in November, 2017, I moved to Alabama, started a new job, and got remarried My husband, Scott, resigned from his position as the pastor of a Southern Baptist church rather than have any controversy or division within his congregation over his remarriage. The first Sunday after we were married, he asked me if I would like to go to Carbon Hill First Presbyterian Church, the only PC(USA) church in our county. I know this was an attempt to make me feel more at home in my new home. The church was welcoming and loving. We visited a different church the next week and then were traveling for a couple of weeks. When the time came to decide where to go to church the next Sunday we were in town, we both felt drawn back to Carbon Hill First.

In early 2018, as part of our conversations about where we wanted to worship, there was much discussion about theology, liturgy, and worship styles. Even though I have been a member of a PC(USA) congregation for 30 years and was an active elder when I moved, I found that there were questions that I could not adequately answer and explanations about why we believed or did things a particular way in the PC(USA) that I could not articulate clearly. Carbon Hill FPC was without a minister so we didn't have that resource to call upon. Being a librarian by vocation and after learning about CRE/CLP through the presbytery, I began to research the Certificate in Congregational Leadership program at the University of Dubuque Theological Seminary and it spoke to me. I wanted to use this program to deepen my knowledge of The Bible and grow in my Christian faith. I completed this program and received my certificate in May, 2020.

Carbon Hill FPC was without a pastor and Scott a pastor without a pulpit so, it wasn't long until he was asked to preach, which he has done at Carbon Hill FPC off and on since. In December,

2019, Scott and I joined Carbon Hill FPC by reaffirmation of faith. We worked with the worship leader to put church services online via Facebook streaming during COVID.

We were away from Carbon Hill FPC for a time while Scott fulfilled calls to other churches. Now that we are back home at Carbon Hill FPC, I hope that I can use what I learned to serve the church in Carbon Hill much like I did my church in North Carolina.

Sharon Johnson Stewart
Statement of Faith

I believe in one triune God: God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. God the Father created all things, seen and unseen. God created all humankind equally in God's own image.

I believe that because sin entered the world and separated us from God, Jesus Christ was sent to earth, fully human and fully divine, to proclaim the reign of God, preach the good news, heal, and teach by word and deed what it looks like in the Kingdom of God. Jesus Christ was unjustly condemned and crucified. After three days he rose from the dead and in his resurrection and ascension broke the power of sin and death to provide for our salvation.

I believe that I belong to God and was loved by God even before I was capable of loving and am loved by God even when I rebel against God. God shows me his love, mercy, and grace and I should respond in praise and with gratitude. I live out God's love, mercy, and grace as I strive to follow the commandment Jesus gave to love the Lord with all our hearts and soul and mind and to love our neighbors as ourselves. (Matthew 22:37-39 paraphrase)

Information Items:

The Executive Council of PSL held regular, monthly meetings in June and July 2026. EC received a revised job description for the position of Recording Clerk from Personnel. The job description was approved, and EC empowered Personnel and PSL Staff to proceed with advertising the position and filling it. Linda Burrowes tendered her resignation from the position effective December 31, 2026 at the latest. EC commended Linda for her many years of invaluable service to PSL in a variety of capacities.

The Anti Racism Committee took responsibility for the Opportunities Enrichment portion of today's meeting. The ENC has taken responsibility for the same during the November meeting of presbytery. Work continues in earnest at the school site in Annemanie. The Wilcox County Task Force and Volunteer Mission Coordinator are sharing management of the grant process there. Additional resources are being identified and made available to support ministry revitalization efforts in that community.

EC is beginning to have conversation about what it means for presbytery to be active in Christ's ongoing ministry of reconciliation. The topic will be discussed further in September and will include conversations with those who have experienced harm and / or restriction in ministry and witness due to previous limitations originated by our polity.

In January, priorities for EC 2026 were solidified. They are:

1. EC will facilitate Opportunities for Enrichment at each Presbytery meeting in 2026.
2. Emphasizing and enhancing connectional nature with smaller congregations.
3. Encourage congregations to designate Pentecost Offering 2026 to the Congo Partnership Scholarship program.
4. Follow and empower redevelopment of UKirk B'ham.
5. Future connection for some congregations with Rooted Good and Project Regeneration.
6. Continued advocacy and support for Matthew 25 Initiative.

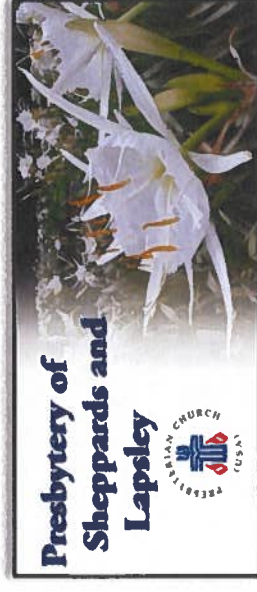

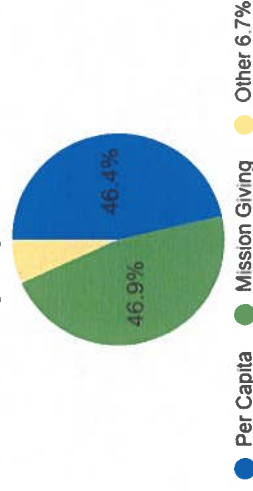

on the 227th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)

I strive to be thought of as a member of presbytery who takes the work of the Church far more seriously than he takes himself. Serving as a Commissioner to GA this summer was thrilling, maddening, exhausting, deeply fulfilling, and a whole lot of nerdy fun.

I am grateful to my fellow Sheppards and Lapsley Commissioners; Adrienne Royster, Daryl Love, and Rick Atkerson were incredible, thoughtful friends to have seated close by. We might have laughed just a bit. Young Adult Advisory Delegate McClain Robinson was a joy to work with, incredibly engaged, and offered us much wisdom.

Our outgoing Co-Moderators, the Revs. CeCe Armstrong and Tony Larson, did an outstanding job (again) leading the Assembly through long stretches of discernment and polity wrinkles, always reminding us to breathe, and that we were there to seek the will of Christ. I invite you to join me in deepest prayer for the Rev. Marta Pumroy-Cordero and the Rev. Dr. Kristopher Schonelmeyer as they serve as Co-Moderators for the next two years.

So much consequential action was taken by the Assembly, but I must start with my experience as a committee leader. It was an honor to be asked to be a vice-moderator and I gained a fantastic new friend in CRE Miriam Hollar of South Louisiana Presbytery. We gelled instantly this spring and, with a ton of help from the rest of our committee leadership, managed to work our committee through some staggering business with trust, equity, thoughtfulness, and prayer. Constitutional Interpretation tackled two of the issues that defined the larger Assembly for me, and I am proud of the work we did. I thoroughly enjoyed working behind the scenes and with so many stellar denominational leaders.

I am happy to go into a ton of detail about specific overtures with any presbyter or congregant who cares to do so. In this report I'll simply state that two major issues ran through the entire assembly. The most obvious one to those watching or reading at home was the denomination's handling of World Mission restructuring over the past year-plus. The decision to dismiss Mission Co-Workers brought plenty of grief and confusion on its own, but the manner in which it was enacted has caused a breach in trust between Presbyterians and Louisville. I went into the Assembly feeling ambivalent — heartbroken for our Mission Co-Workers, but aware that stories are often more complicated than they appear. Then I witnessed certain denominational leaders lie to my committee, and my disappointment guided my votes. An investigation will likely turn up more ugliness. It will take something greater, with God's help, for trust to be rebuilt and for the PC(USA) to cast a new vision for international mission.

The second issue that flavored the 227th GA was less obvious from afar. Presbyterians for the Kingdom clearly viewed GA 227 as its coming out party to the denomination. I will not argue with particular points of theology here. I encourage you to see their website, where PftK is very clear about what they believe. I believe these siblings in Christ are misguided in their work, wrong about

the direction of the PC(USA), and are likely learning some lessons about mutual forbearance and reputability. I am a firm believer that honest questions and debate are healthy for our church. That said, my committee, and then the Assembly, was handed a meaningless and unserious overture crafted to cause trouble. Thanks be to God, both Constitutional Interpretation and the General Assembly found a wiser path.

I was deeply encouraged to see all Climate Justice overtures pass on the Consent Agenda, to find messy, very Presbyterian attempts at justice at every turn, and to join in a resounding "YES!" (after some contention in committee work) to bringing the 228th General Assembly to San Juan, Puerto Rico. My mom's Puerto Rican family in New York is rejoicing, even if they still don't quite know what a Presbyterian is.

Seeing friends from decades ago, hugging former Sheppards and Lapsley pastors, inquirers, and candidates, making a ton of new friends, and worshiping with all of them was a genuinely holy experience. I am grateful for your trust in asking me to serve. I am eager to make it to another General Assembly in some capacity soon. Thanks for getting me hooked, PSL!

Reflections on GA227

It was an honor and a privilege to serve as a commissioner to the 227th General Assembly on behalf of the Presbytery of Sheppards and Lapsley.

Having followed many of the issues from GA226, I was somewhat prepared for the long days and for several of the matters that would come before us. What was new for me was experiencing the General Assembly process firsthand. I was impressed by the orderly way commissioners could express very different opinions, deliberate together, and ultimately make decisions under Robert's Rules of Order.

The three days of virtual committee meetings also helped prepare us for the larger Assembly and gave us an opportunity to begin building relationships with fellow commissioners.

The Assembly considered a wide range of issues, including environmental and racial justice, gender and sexuality, ordination, and the continuing restructuring of the denomination. Some of the most difficult conversations centered on that restructuring, particularly changes involving world mission. At times, disagreement became tense enough that the moderators had to remind us of the importance of treating one another with kindness.

I served on the Theological Education and Ordination Committee, which considered sixteen overtures. One action that particularly interested me was the creation of a team to study a more collaborative approach to ordered ministry. I believe this could eventually offer creative opportunities for smaller congregations to share pastoral leadership and other resources.

There were certainly challenging moments at GA227, but there were also moments of celebration, enthusiasm, and even dancing in the aisles. What impressed me most, however, were the ecumenical partners who addressed the Assembly. Their messages reminded me that our ministry extends beyond our denomination and that, even amid disagreement, we are part of a much larger community of faith.

I am grateful for the opportunity to have served, to have listened, and to have participated in the work of the wider church.

2027 Benefits Plan Subsidies and Updates

Support for congregations and ministers with dependent children

To help congregations care for their pastoral leaders, and to promote wholeness for ministers and their families, the 2027 Benefits Plan introduces expanded support.

- **An additional dues subsidy** will be available to congregational pastoral leaders enrolled in the Congregational Pastors Package to help alleviate the cost of dependent child medical coverage. Effective Jan. 1, 2027, the subsidy will be 50% of the national, community-rated coverage cost for dependent children. This subsidy will reduce the flat rates for both Child(ren) and Family coverage levels.
- **Transitional Pastor's Participation** and its inherent subsidies will be extended through 2029, giving congregations and ministers already enrolled in this package two more years to transition to the Congregational Pastors Package.

2027 dues for the Congregational Pastors Package and Transitional Pastor's Participation will be available in July.



New Child Care Support grant

Effective April 1, 2026, this new grant through the Assistance Program helps offset the cost of child care for children ages 0-6 years. Child Care Support provides \$500 per child per month (up to \$1,500 per family per month) to eligible PC(USA) ministers of the Word and Sacrament and commissioned pastors during the initial pilot phase of this grant.

Additional Medical Plan options

For staff not enrolled in benefits through the Congregational Pastors Package or Transitional Pastor's Participation, three additional Medical Plan options have been introduced: a second PPO, EPO, and HDHP. These options will be available in addition to the three options currently offered, for a total of six options, effective Jan. 1, 2027. More details will be shared this summer.

Ministers and dependents enrolled in the Congregational Pastors Package or Transitional Pastor's Participation will continue to be offered the current PPO plan.

Dear Friends in Christ,

At the Presbyterian Home for Children, every day is centered on helping children and families build stronger futures. We are grateful to share three examples of that mission in action: the launch and early success of our Robinson Family Unity Center as an expansion of Secure Dwellings, continued progress on the Journey Capital Campaign to strengthen our campus for future generations, and another outstanding year of academic achievement at our fully accredited private school, Ascension Leadership Academy. Together, these ministries reflect the Home's commitment to providing hope, healing, education, and opportunity through the faithful support of Presbyterian churches and generous friends.



The Presbyterian Home for Children's Journey Capital Campaign continues to make significant progress as we restore and improve our historic campus to better serve children, young adults, and families for generations to come.



Over the decades, the Home's cottages, chapel, and campus buildings have provided places of healing, hope, and transformation. Today, those facilities continue to support programs that help mothers reunite with their children, young adults prepare for independent living, and families find stability.

The \$1.7 million Journey Capital Campaign, which began in 2025 and continues through 2027, is funding renovations to residential cottages, the campus chapel, and other critical infrastructure improvements that directly support our ministry.



We are deeply grateful for the generosity of Presbyterian churches and faithful supporters who have invested in this effort. Providence Presbyterian Church in Montgomery designated \$611,100 to the Home when the congregation closed, and the restored chapel will be named in honor of Providence Presbyterian Chapel so its ministry will continue through the lives touched on our campus. Additionally, we have renamed Gabbie Cottage in Union Village to Westminster Memorial Cottage to reflect the faithful legacy of Westminster Presbyterian Church and Memorial Presbyterian Church. The campaign has also been blessed by a \$280,000 investment from the Calhoun Presbyterian Apartments Foundation, along with gifts from alumni, foundations, grants, and other donors. We were also successful in selling a cell phone tower for \$200,000 to help support our campus investments.



Recent improvements include the completion of major renovations to Westminster Memorial Cottage, a new playground and pavilion for families in our Secure Dwellings program, campus sidewalk improvements, and renovations to several residential cottages and supporting infrastructure. Future projects include restoring the historic chapel as a center for worship, prayer, Bible study, and counseling, along with continued renovations to Johnson Hall, home to our Transition to Adult Living program for young women.

Thanks to the generosity of God's people, the remaining need for the Journey Capital Campaign has been reduced to \$423,600. Every gift helps ensure that the Presbyterian Home for Children remains a safe, welcoming, and Christ-centered place where vulnerable children and families can find hope, healing, and a brighter future.

We are grateful to the congregations and individuals throughout the Presbytery of Sheppards and Lapsley whose faithful support continues to strengthen this ministry.

One of the Presbyterian Home for Children's newest ministries is already making a meaningful difference for families working toward reunification.

The Robinson Family Unity Center serves mothers whose children have entered foster care through the Alabama Department of Human Resources (DHR) because they lacked suitable housing or faced other barriers to providing a stable home. PHFC's program provides safe housing, case management, advocacy, and individualized support while mothers work to meet court and DHR requirements necessary to regain custody of their children.



This spring, one Robinson mother named Faith successfully regained custody of her children after working with Home staff to secure employment, establish stable housing, and demonstrate her readiness to provide a safe home. Our staff member Shandra Thomas, who came to the Home

more than a decade ago with seven children in need of housing and today is a PHFC social worker, advocated for Faith before a judge in court and her testimony led to Faith getting custody of her children back.

Once mothers are reunified with their children, they may transition into PHFC's Secure Dwellings program, where they continue building toward long-term independence. Secure Dwellings provides housing and ongoing support for up to two years while mothers pursue education or employment, strengthen parenting skills, and work toward financial stability.

Children in the Secure Dwellings program attend our private school, Ascension Leadership Academy, that also serves children in the Talladega area community.

This May, Ascension celebrated another successful school year marked by academic achievement and student success.

The Class of 2026 graduated four seniors who collectively earned a record \$240,000 in college scholarships, helping open the door to higher education and bright futures. Damian Brown was named valedictorian, while Maddie Parker was recognized as salutatorian.

The school also celebrated the recognition of Assistant Director Charles Ponder as Private School Teacher of the Year by the Chamber of Talladega, Lincoln and Munford, honoring his commitment to student success and excellence in education.

Academically, ALA students continued to perform well on national assessments, with 64% meeting or exceeding the national average in reading, 70% in language usage, and 62% in mathematics. In addition, the elementary school was named an Imagine Learning School of Excellence, placing it among just 293 schools nationwide recognized for outstanding student growth and innovative use of educational technology.

These accomplishments reflect the Presbyterian Home for Children's ongoing commitment to providing a Christ-centered, accredited education that prepares students for success in college, careers, and life.

As always, we thank you for your continued prayers, encouragement, and partnership in this ministry. Because of your support, the Presbyterian Home for Children is able to restore families, educate young people, and provide safe places where lives are transformed. We are grateful for the congregations of the Presbytery of Sheppards and Lapsley and invite you to continue sharing our ministry with families who may need our services and with others who feel called to support this important work.
